The event was in support of the Sussex Six Campaign, which aims to boost the presence of local produce on menus and shop shelves throughout the county.

The campaign is managed by Natural Partnerships CIC and funded by the UK Government through the Council's allocation of UK Shared Prosperity Funding and other Sussex district and borough councils.





Progress towards a new local government model for West Sussex

On 26 September, councils across West Sussex submitted a joint proposal to the Government on the best way to organise local government in the county.

Proposals came from close collaboration and detailed modelling which formed our response to central Government's call for recommendations on how services can be delivered in the future.

The Government want to replace the current two-tier system (where county and district or



borough councils share responsibilities) with a unitary model, where one council handles all local services.





The recommendation for our area

In West Sussex, all district and borough councils agree that the best option is to create two unitary authorities for the whole county. For our residents, the proposal would see a new council combining the footprints of Horsham District, Crawley Borough, and Mid Sussex District and give a single point of contact for all local services.

The proposal is based on feedback from over 9000 residents and stakeholders on three financially viable options. Your feedback showed strong support for this two-unitary model. This model offers better representation in regional decision-making than a single unitary for the county. The Council also felt that this approach was the strongest for economic growth for our area and would put residents first, giving a more local focus on housing, social care and leisure and community services.

While there are challenges in separating county-wide services, we are confident that the transition can be managed effectively. We are committed to maximising the opportunity to build a system designed around local needs for now and for the future.

Next steps

A formal Government-led public consultation on the proposed options for our area is expected to take place from **November 2025 to January 2026**, and residents are encouraged to take part. A final decision is due in **Spring 2026**, with changes likely to begin in **April 2028**.

Horsham Town Community Governance Review

We recently undertook a consultation seeking views from residents. local businesses and community groups on whether Horsham Town Centre area should have a town council.

Three quarters of the responses received supported the creation of a town council.

Following this, a second consultation asked for views on what the Town Council should be called, how it could work in terms of the number of councillors and wards it would have and how these wards should be divided. The second consultation closed on 29 September.

The feedback is being considered and will be discussed in our Governance Committee meeting in November and if recommended at our Council meeting in December.

Designing a **Horsham Town Centre vision** together

Horsham District Council recently invited the community to share their thoughts on proposed improvements to key areas of the Town Centre. including the Bishopric, Worthing Road, and Carfax.

More than 1,000 residents, visitors, and businesses took part through our online consultation. drop-in sessions, and stakeholder meetings.

Your feedback

Feedback highlighted the importance of preserving Horsham's unique character, while also addressing practical concerns like accessibility, value for money, and balancing the needs of pedestrians, cyclists, businesses and public transport. Suggestions from the community have directly influenced revised plans, which now include more planting, improved seating, enhanced cycle parking, and better facilities for markets and outdoor events.

Following this, a petition to retain the stream feature in the Bishopric was discussed at our Council meeting on 24 September. After consideration, Council agreed to revisit designs ensuring that the comments on the character of the area and value to residents were incorporated while balancing important practical concerns.

Investing in the improvements

We will now proceed with further design work incorporating the feedback. We are preparing to take on the design and build of the Bishopric improvements within the next two years.

We are looking forward to seeing an even safer, greener, and more inclusive town centre that everyone can enjoy.

Team effort brings a fresh look to our car parks

Over the last few months, members of our Parking Services team have been working hard to improve the look and feel of our car parks.

This has been helped by a significant programme of cleaning and painting across our town centre sites, undertaken in partnership with the Probation Service's Community Payback Scheme.

Projects that make a difference

Community Payback gives people on probation the opportunity to complete unpaid work as part of a court sentence, ranging from 40 to 300 hours. Under guidance, groups of up to eight people are taken out into the community to carry out projects that make a real difference, such as painting, decorating, grounds maintenance and deep cleaning.

Through this initiative a wide range of improvements, including repairs, graffiti removal in stairwells, and fresh coats of paint have brightened up several car parks.

Supporting the work

Behind the scenes, our team have done an outstanding job keeping everything running smoothly from ensuring risk assessments were completed to cordoning off areas safely, and making sure work was carried out to the highest standard.

This is a fantastic example of public organisations working together to deliver improvements while also reducing costs for the Council.

The benefits go even further: enhancing the experience of car park users, improving safety and accessibility, and helping those on probation to give back positively to their local community.

Our partnership working has delivered visible improvements that benefit both the Council and the community.





Food waste collections are coming

Weekly household food waste collections will launch in the Horsham District in the spring.

Your refuse and recycling collections will continue as usual every other week: these new food waste collections are an additional service.

Why we are introducing food waste collections

Food waste collections are being introduced to help us improve our recycling rates and to comply with new legislation that requires all councils in England to collect food waste from spring 2026.

More than 40% of the rubbish in an average Horsham District bin by tonnage is food waste.

If this food waste is collected and processed separately from general waste it can be used in agriculture as a bio fertiliser, or to generate natural forms of energy such as biogas.

About your new food waste collections

Collections are due to start in March and April 2026, the exact date will depend on where in Horsham District you live. We will be writing to all residents in January about how the service will work and when your collections will begin.

You will receive a lockable food waste bin to put outside your property and a smaller caddy designed for indoor use. These will be delivered to you before your collections start, along with your first roll of compostable liners. The liners will help to keep the caddy

> clean and make it easier to transfer the contents to your food waste bin. You could also use newspaper or kitchen roll to line your caddy.

How to use your new caddy

Store your smaller caddy in a convenient place in your kitchen, line it with a liner and put all your cooked and uncooked food waste in it, including tea bags, dairy products, and even bones.



When your caddy is full, move the contents to the outside grey and orange food waste bin which is sealable and lockable, so no unwelcome smells!

Your food waste will be collected every week on your normal bin collection day - even if you only make a small amount of food waste we will always empty your bin.

We are working closely with West Sussex Waste Partnership (WSWP) to help deliver these changes.



Peace of mind, at the press of a button

Community Link helps residents stay safe, independent, and connected.

For many of us, feeling secure at home is something we don't think twice about. But for residents with health concerns, those recovering from illness or injury, or simply due to age, living independently can bring a few more worries.

That's where Community Link comes in. Our telecare service supports residents who want to continue living in their own homes with confidence and peace of mind. Whether it's a simple pendant alarm or more tailored technology, our discreet devices offer help at the touch of a button, 24 hours a day.

Our devices

The most popular option is a small, wearable alarm worn around the neck or wrist. If something unexpected happens, like a fall or feeling unwell, pressing the button immediately connects the user to a friendly, trained advisor at our alarm receiving centre. They'll assess the situation and get the right help. whether that's a family member, a neighbour, or emergency services.

Other options include GPS trackers for those who would like support while out and about. Every package is built around the individual, their lifestyle, and their needs.

Meet Mrs Fox

We visited Mrs Fox, one of our wearable alarm users. She initially opted for a pendant alarm after a minor slip in the garden. She told us how it became a lifesaver recently:

"I'd had the device for some time with no incidents. Then, when I was hanging out the washing, I lost my balance and found myself on my back on the patio.

"I wasn't panicking. I thought, you've got your alarm, press it.

"It connected almost immediately. and it was as if he (the call handler) was right next to me asking if I was alright."

Help at hand

Luckily, Mrs Fox's son was nearby and able to come over quickly and wait with her for the ambulance. After surgery on her hip, she is now back home recuperating. Mrs Fox now uses one of our Fall Alarms, which includes a fall detector in addition to the button. These automatically trigger an alert in the event of a fall, even if the user is unable to press the button. Our 24-hour monitoring centre team can then raise the alarm and get help.

Affordable, reliable, and local

Community Link is run by Horsham District Council. Our team understands the challenges people face and is here to help. We work with other agencies to provide comprehensive support, working with West Sussex Fire and Rescue to fit smoke alarms alongside our devices, and with NHS services to ensure patients returning home from hospital have the right equipment in place to support their recovery.

KNOW Did You



Pension Credit

If you are over State Pension age, you may be eligible to claim Pension Credit, even if you own your home or have savings. People who claim Pension Credit may also be able to get help with heating costs, rent and Council Tax, a free TV licence for those aged 75 or over, and help with the cost of NHS services.

STATE PENSION AGE



Reminder to check your State Pension age

The State Pension age increase from 66 years old to 67 years old will first affect those born between 6 April 1960 and 5 March 1961.

Anyone born between these dates can check the State pension age calculator at: www.gov.uk/ state-pension-age to find out the earliest point at which they'll be eligible for their State Pension.

Attendance Allowance

Attendance Allowance is a weekly payment to help people who are of pension age or over with long term physical or mental conditions with extra costs. It is based on how your condition affects you and is not means tested, so your savings or income will not affect your claim nor any other benefits you might receive.



Constant improvement from our Parks and Countryside team

To keep our beautiful green spaces looking their best, a continuous programme of maintenance takes place behind the scenes.

Our teams work in all weathers to enhance the landscapes, features and biodiverse spaces that make our towns and villages so appealing.

Environment Agency work at Bramber Brooks enhances the visitor experience

Recent work at our Bramber Brooks site has now been completed.

The project involved creating a series of ponds to improve

the wetland habitat, along with raised walkways and new interpretation boards for visitors.

Upgrades to Horsham play zones add to the appeal

At the Cook Road play area, we carried out upgrades including new safety surfacing and the replacement of old play equipment.

Roffey Rec's Numuga (multi-sports area) is now brighter and more

cheerful thanks to its fresh colourful surfacing. The block colour helps zone the playing areas and add an even more fun, vibrant feel to the space.

Our Parks team have also been busy preparing renewal of play areas at Durfold Road and Keats Close in Horsham, to make sure they best meet the needs of all our residents.

Sharing our love of nature

Alongside habitat management work, our team were up early in the morning and working late at night to give residents the chance to discover birds, bats and moths up close.

Highlights of bird ringing sessions at Warnham Local Nature Reserve

included the
Bullfinch, Goldcrest
and Grasshopper
Warbler, while at
Chesworth Farm,
moths and bats
aplenty were spotted.

Boosting biodiversity

We recently installed a new eco-island at The Tanyard in Henfield, to support biodiversity. It will provide nesting spots and shelter for birds, insects, and aquatic life while plant roots help clean the water by absorbing excess nutrients.

Dormice received upgraded living quarters in Southwater (above), and during our orchid-counting session at the Country Park, conducted by regular Horsham Green Gym volunteers, over 4,400 orchids were recorded. We also undertook pond clearance work. This will benefit those enjoying water sports as well as providing ecological improvements for aquatic species.

Working with our amazing volunteers

We collaborate with numerous volunteer conservation groups who provide invaluable support throughout the year. Recent projects included regular maintenance, removing invasive plants, undertaking coppicing work, and raking the marsh

area at Henfield Common. We are incredibly grateful to all the groups that support us.

Planting up history: heritage orchards boost biodiversity

Operating across the District, the Wilder Horsham District partnership between Sussex Wildlife Trust and **Horsham District Council** supports the restoration and connection of natural habitats.

Volunteer work parties are at the heart of this effort.

Reviving traditional orchards for a greener future

Recently, the project helped two landowners to plant orchards comprised of traditional apple and plum varieties, to enrich local biodiversity.

A haven for pollinators and wildlife

Orchards help create rich, varied habitats perfect for a variety of wildlife. As they age, orchard trees attract invertebrates and nesting birds. Flowers, buds and fruit provide all-season food for pollinators and birds such as Bullfinch and migrating Thrushes. Orchards planted with

locally developed or 'heritage' fruit varieties also act as genetic vaults, safeguarding traits adapted to the area's weather, climate and pests. In 2024/25, Wilder Horsham District team planted 157 new orchard trees, at Mayes Park in Warnham and Aspect Nature Reserve in Rusper.

A new orchard at Mayes Park

Wilder Horsham District's volunteer workforce helped farmer, James Clapshaw, to recreate a lost landscape on the footprint of an old plum orchard. James sourced a mixture of early and late-fruiting apple and plum varieties, with names like Crawley Reinette, Wadhurst Pippin and Sussex Mother, with the help of a specialist tree nursery and Brogdale National Fruit Collection. Two days of tree planting by our volunteers followed, with each sapling fenced to protect them from browsing deer. The resulting 'wood pasture' will provide a connecting habitat between the open fields and shady woodland already present at Mayes Park and contribute to the wider Horsham District Nature Recovery Network. In time, it may also encourage back species like the Redstart, ants and

a wealth of wildflowers that have declined with the destruction of orchard habitats during the 20th century.

A legacy of nature and community

The project, which blends conservation with community participation, nurtures a thriving ecosystem. It also strengthens Sussex's identity as a resilient, heritage-led producer of quality local food. Volunteers, growers, and residents are cultivating a sustainable legacy for nature, economy, and community alike.

The Nature Recovery Award

For custodians of local land including landowners, land managers and community groups, The Nature Recovery Award offers grant funding up to £5,000 to support practical schemes that enhance and connect habitats across the Horsham District landscape.

Bridging the wellbeing gap

At Horsham District Wellbeing, we want everyone to be able to use our services easily.

We know that for people with learning or physical disabilities, getting the right care can sometimes be tricky. That's why making reasonable adjustments is important.

What are reasonable adjustments?

Reasonable adjustments are changes services or organisations make to help people access care. They're part of laws like the Equality Act 2010, which exist because people with disabilities often have poorer health outcomes. This can happen because it's harder for them to get the right care or understand the advice they're given.

At Horsham District Wellbeing, we focus on preventing health problems before they happen, and we want to help improve health for everyone in

our community. We'll adjust how we support you to make sure you can get the help you need, no matter what your disability.

What adjustments can you ask for?

- Appointment length and timing: if you need a longer appointment with more time to take things in, we can sort that out.
- Accessible materials: if you want information in Easy Read versions with simple language, large print or pictures to help explain things, we can provide those.
- Where we meet: if it's hard to travel, we offer appointments at different locations across the District, by phone or video call if that works better for you.
- Making the space comfortable: if you prefer quieter times, low lighting, extra room for a wheelchair, or want to bring someone with you, just let us know.
- Languages: we have a limited number of volunteer translators that may be able to help, but we can also print information in other languages. If you have a friend, family member or someone else that can help translate, they're welcome to come with you.

If you need any of these or something else, just tell us when you book your appointment.

We'll do our best to help.

Local partners unite to address housing challenges

On 14 July we hosted Homes for Tomorrow, a summit-style event with a focus on tackling local housing challenges and working together to find solutions.

Bringing together local and national expertise

The event brought together a wide range of partners - from central Government representatives to housebuilders, housing associations, community organisations and officers from West Sussex County Council and Horsham District Council. The goal was to share knowledge, listen to different perspectives from professional groups, and explore ways to overcome the complex barriers to housing delivery

Understanding challenges

Speakers representing central Government gave overviews of the Government's plans to create more affordable housing and an update on their work combatting homelessness.

Our Council's senior planning officers presented the current challenges they face in terms of housing targets and incoming changes to the planning system. The Chief Executive of Horsham District Council's main housing partner, Saxon Weald spoke about their work, in particular on the development of Extra Care housing for the District.

Action in Rural Sussex spoke about how community-led housing can be beneficial.

Open question and answer rounds and a panel session at the end of the day created opportunities for all those attending to share expertise and learn from each other.

Shaping our new strategy

The insights gathered during the day will help shape the Council's new Homes for Tomorrow strategy, set to be launched in early 2026.

The strategy will focus on increasing the supply of affordable homes, supporting vulnerable residents, and making sure housing growth is sustainable for future generations. An annual action plan will help keep progress on track.

Leading the way

Horsham District Council is proud to be leading this work. By bringing the right people together and driving the conversation forward, we are committed to finding longterm solutions to helping residents find a safe, secure, and suitable place to call home.

Helping our vital community organisations save energy



One way we help our local community organisations reduce their carbon emissions and add community value is through the Community Climate Fund.

Energy saving projects

We have supported 38 projects across the District at local community buildings over the past five years.

Many of these projects involved retrofitting lighting to LEDs, ranging from hall and foyer lights to floodlights on sports pitches. One group used the funding to buy solar lights for their scout camping trips. Other retrofitting measures included installing solar (PV)

> panels, battery storage, radiator valves and heating controls, heat pumps, insulation, and more efficient water taps and toilet flushers.

Could we help your organisation?

The grant of up to £5,000 is available for new projects meeting one or more climate priority categories, including reducing carbon emissions or energy consumption, minimising waste and water usage or increasing biodiversity and sustainable transport.

When can I apply?

The fund opens four times a year, in January, April, June and September. The next round is open between 1 - 31 January 2026.

Damp and mould can be more than just a nuisance in the home, it can affect

health, damage belongings, and make day to day living uncomfortable, or even unsafe.

Dampness and mould growth can be hard to deal with, especially during the winter months, when it is not unusual for properties to show signs of condensation and mould. This is made worse as the weather gets colder.

On our website you can find some tips and useful links to tackle mould and condensation in your home.

Our Environmental Health team works behind the scenes every day to help tackle these issues and protect residents, especially the most vulnerable.

Renters: know your rights

If you rent your home, it's your landlord's legal duty to ensure the property is free from

> serious hazards and that includes damp and mould. Recent updates to the law are coming to strengthen these protections, especially for social and private tenants.

All rented homes must be safe and healthy to live in.

If you have problems with damp, you must report this to your landlord and give them a reasonable time to respond.

If you need advice or your landlord has failed to act over problems reported to them by you, please contact us.

What we do

When a report comes in about damp or mould, our officers can visit the property to assess the situation. They'll look at what's causing the problem, whether it's poor ventilation, a leak,

or structural issues and what needs to be done to fix it.

Our team works with landlords to help ensure they carry out the necessary repairs.

In more serious cases, when the landlord does not respond. we can take enforcement action to make sure homes are made safe and healthy.

Our goal is always to work constructively, helping tenants feel supported and landlords understand their responsibilities.

What you can do

If you rent

Report issues early to your landlord or letting agent. Keep records of any communications and photos of the issue.

If you are having problems with condensation

It can help if you:

- open windows regularly
- cover pans when you cook
- drv clothes outdoors or in a drver
- close internal doors when you cook or shower
- use extractor fans in the kitchen and bathroom
- leave a gap between furniture and external walls
- wipe condensation from windowsills each morning






